# CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA SEPTEMBER 7, 2021, REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING AND FIRST BUDGET HEARING DRAFT MEETING MINUTES

### I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Watford called the regular meeting of the City Council for the City of Okeechobee to order on Tuesday, September 7, 2021, at 6:00 P.M. in the City Council Chambers, located at 55 Southeast 3rd Avenue, Room 200, Okeechobee, Florida. The invocation was offered by Pastor Don Hanna of the First United Methodist Church, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Council Member Chandler.

#### II. ATTENDANCE

Roll was taken by City Clerk Lane Gamiotea to establish a quorum. Members present: Mayor Dowling R. Watford, Jr., Council Members Noel Chandler, Monica Clark, Bob Jarriel, and Bobby Keefe.

#### III. AGENDA AND PUBLIC COMMENTS

- A. Mayor Watford asked whether there were any agenda items to be added, deferred, or withdrawn. New Business Item G was amended to Item H; Item G, Exhibit 14 was added.
- **B.** Motion by Council Member Keefe, seconded by Council Member Chandler to approve the agenda as amended. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.
- **C.** There were no agenda item forms or comment cards submitted for public participation.

#### IV. PRESENTATION AND PROCLAMATIONS

Mayor Watford proclaimed the month of September 2021 as Suicide Prevention Awareness Month and read the document into the record as follows: "Whereas, September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month, which directs the community's attention to this public health epidemic destroying lives, whole families, and sometimes entire communities; and Whereas, suicide rates on the Treasure Coast and in Okeechobee were increasing in the first half of 2021 according to our Medical Examiner's Office; and Whereas, there were nearly two and a half times as many suicides (47,511) in the United States as there were homicides (19,141); and Whereas, for every completed suicide in 2019, there were 29.05 attempts at suicide; and Whereas, the second leading cause of death for ages 10 to 34 and the fourth leading cause for ages 35 to 54, suicide is a major contributor to premature mortality; and Whereas, in 2019, the age-adjusted rate per 100,000 population of Suicide Deaths (All) in Okeechobee County was 21.9 compared to Florida at 14.5; and Whereas, suicide is the only type of death that is 100 percent preventable; and by offering the public education, data, support, and services we as a community have taken a step toward preventing another suicide by our residents; and Whereas, we are honored to be part of the healing process, raising awareness for and support of those affected by suicide by offering supporting services addressing mental health illnesses and drug and alcohol addiction. Now, Therefore, I, Dowling R. Watford, Jr., by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Okeechobee, Florida, do hereby proclaim the month of September 2021 as 'Suicide Prevention Awareness Month'."

# VI. MAYOR WATFORD OPENED THE PUBLIC HEARING FOR ORDINANCE ADOPTION AT 6:06 P.M.

A. Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Clark to read proposed Ordinance No. 1230 by title only, regarding Comprehensive Plan Small Scale Future Land Use (FLU) Map Amendment Application No. 21-004-SSA [as provided in Exhibit 4]. Motion Carried Unanimously.

Mayor Watford read proposed Ordinance No. 1230 by title only as follows: "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; AMENDING THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN ORDINANCE NO. 635 AS AMENDED, BY REVISING THE FLU MAP ON A CERTAIN TRACT OF LAND MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED HEREIN FROM SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (SFR) TO INDUSTRIAL (IND) (APPLICATION NO. 21-004-SSA); PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION OF ORDINANCE AND REVISED FLU MAP IN THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Keefe to adopt proposed Ordinance No. 1230. City Planning Consultant Mr. Ben Smith of LaRue Planning and Management Services presented the Planning Staff findings together with the Planning Board's review on July 15, 2021, and found the requested IND FLU designation for the subject property to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan, reasonably compatible with adjacent uses, and consistent with the urbanizing pattern of the area. Mayor Watford opened the floor for public comment. Mr. Steve Dobbs, 209 Northeast 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Okeechobee, was present on behalf of the applicant and available for questions. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

B. Motion by Council Member Chandler, seconded by Council Member Clark to read proposed Ordinance No. 1236 by title only, amending Code Section 2-172 and Chapter 34 related to Fire Services Interlocal Agreement with Okeechobee County [as provided in Exhibit 5]. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

Mayor Watford read proposed Ordinance No. 1236 by title only as follows: "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; REVISING SECTION 2-172 AND CHAPTER 34 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO REFLECT CHANGES AS A RESULT OF THE CITY ENTERING INTO AN INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH OKEECHOBEE COUNTY TO PROVIDE FIRE SERVICES WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Clark to adopt proposed Ordinance No. 1236. A motion and second by Council Members Keefe and Chandler was made to amend the second 'Whereas' clause of proposed Ordinance No. 1236 as follows: Whereas, as of August 2, 2021, the City no longer has a fire department, no longer provides fire services within the City, and fire services are provided by Okeechobee County through an Interlocal Agreement.

Motion to Amend Carried Unanimously. Vote on Motion as Amended Carried Unanimously.

MAYOR WATFORD CLOSED THE PUBLIC HEARING FOR ORDINANCE ADOPTION AT 6:16 P.M.

#### VII. MAYOR WATFORD OPENED THE FIRST BUDGET PUBLIC HEARING AT 6:16 P.M.

- A. Mayor Watford announced that the purpose of this public hearing was to consider the first reading of ordinances for the proposed millage rate levy and proposed budget for FY 2021-2022.
- **B.** Mayor Watford announced that the proposed millage rate levy represents 3.68 percent more than the roll-back rate computed pursuant to Florida Statutes 200.065(1).
- C. Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to read proposed Ordinance No. 1237 by title only, levying a millage rate of 7.6018 on all real and tangible personal property for proposed FY October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022 [as provided in Exhibit 6]. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

City Attorney Fumero read proposed Ordinance No. 1237 by title only as follows: "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; LEVYING THE AD VALOREM PROPERTY TAX MILLAGE RATE FOR MUNICIPAL PURPOSES ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF STATE LAW FOR THE FY BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2021 AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2022; PROVIDING THAT 7.6018 PER THOUSAND DOLLAR VALUATION SHALL NOT BE LEVIED ON HOMESTEAD PROPERTY; THAT 7.6018 VALUATION SHALL BE USED FOR GENERAL CITY PURPOSES; THAT SAID MILLAGE RATE IS 3.68 PERCENT (3.68%) MORE THAN THE ROLL-BACK RATE OF 7.3317 COMPUTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH FLORIDA STATUTES 200.065(1); PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Keefe to approve the first reading of proposed Ordinance No. 1237 and set the Final Public Hearing for 6:00 P.M., September 27, 2021.

Mayor Watford opened the floor for public comments. Mr. Frank Irby noted for clarification the millage rate is not increasing; the roll-back rate would provide the same amount of ad valorem revenue as last year. The increase in property assessment value at the same millage rate is why there is an increase in the roll-back rate percentage. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

D. Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Keefe to read proposed Ordinance No. 1238 by title only, setting the annual budget for proposed FY October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022 [as provided in Exhibit 7]. Motion Carried Unanimously.

City Attorney Fumero read proposed Ordinance No. 1238 by title only as follows: "AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AN ANNUAL BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; FOR THE FY BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2021, AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2022; APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE FOR THE GENERAL OPERATION OF THE SEVERAL DEPARTMENTS OF THE CITY AND OTHER FIXED OBLIGATIONS OF THE CITY FOR AND DURING THE FISCAL YEAR; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT AND SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Motion by Council Member Chandler, seconded by Council Member Clark to approve the first reading of proposed Ordinance No. 1238 and set the Final Public Hearing date for 6:00 P.M., September 27, 2021.

#### VIII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to read proposed Ordinance No. 1239 by title only, amending the General Employees' Pension Plan [as provided in Exhibit 8]. Motion Carried. Unanimously.

City Attorney Fumero read proposed Ordinance No. 1239 by title only as follows: "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE FURTHER AMENDING THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE GENERAL EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM, RESTATED PURSUANT TO ORDINANCE 1141; AMENDING SECTION 6, BENEFIT AMOUNTS AND ELIGIBILITY; AMENDING SECTION 10, OPTIONAL FORMS OF BENEFITS; AMENDING SECTION 15, MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION OF BENEFITS; AMENDING SECTION 25, REEMPLOYMENT AFTER RETIREMENT; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to approve the first reading of proposed Ordinance No. 1239 and set September 2, 2021, as the Final Public Hearing date. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

**B.** Motion by Council Member Keefe, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to adopt proposed Resolution No. 2021-07 regarding the Lake Okeechobee System Operating Manual [as provided in Exhibit 9].

City Attorney Fumero read proposed Resolution No. 2021-07 by title only as follows: "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; ON THE RE-EVALUATION OF LAKE OKEECHOBEE OPERATIONS BY THE U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS PURSUANT TO THE NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT ASSESSMENT FOR THE LAKE OKEECHOBEE SYSTEM OPERATING MANUAL; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

It was noted for the record that the word "agriculture" would be added to the first 'Whereas' clause between the words businesses and public. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

#### VIII. NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED

- C. Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Clark to approve Okeechobee Main Street's request to place personalized hometown Veterans' banners in the downtown area during the month of November to celebrate our local Veterans [as provided in Exhibit 10]. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.
- D. Motion by Council Member Keefe, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to accept the four selected firms for the Request For Qualification No. ADM 01-32-07-21 as pre-qualified to utilize when needed [as provided in Exhibit 11]. **Motion Carried Unanimously.**
- E. Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Jarriel to authorize the City Administrator to approve temporary part-time positions when appropriate; i.e. full-time personnel absent for an extended period of time; workload requiring additional resources [as provided in Exhibit 12]. Motion Carried Unanimously.
- F. Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Clark to appoint Gary Ritter as the City Administrator effective September 21, 2021, completing the three-month probationary period. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.
- **G.** ITEM ADDED TO AGENDA: Motion by Council Member Jarriel, seconded by Council Member Keefe to approve the recommendation from the Flagler Park Design Review Advisory Committee for the Cattlemen's Square Park [as presented in Exhibit 14]. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

An offer was presented by Mr. Frank Irby, as Chair and on behalf of the Frank Altobello Trust, to contribute a monetary donation of up to \$100,000.00 to match future funds expended by the City for this project. **The consensus of the Council was to accept the monetary donation**.

H. Motion by Council Member Clark, seconded by Council Member Chandler to promote Assistant Police Chief Donald Hagan to Chief of Police effective September 1, 2021 [as provided in Exhibit 13]. **Motion Carried Unanimously**.

City Clerk Lane Gamiotea administered the Oath of Office as follows: "I, Donald C. Hagan, do solemnly swear that I will support, protect, and defend the Constitution and Government of the United States and of the State of Florida; that I am duly qualified to hold office under the Constitution of the state; and that I will well and faithfully perform the duties of the Office of the Chief of Police for the City of Okeechobee, Florida on which I am about to enter, So help me God." And thereafter shall devote personal attention to the duties of the office, and continue in office until a successor is appointed by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Okeechobee, Florida. He was pinned with his Chief Badge by his wife and children.

#### IX. CITY ATTORNEY UPDATE

Attorney Fumero introduced the firm's new Attorney, Gloria Velasquez, who has extensive knowledge with planning and development.

#### X. CITY ADMINISTRATOR UPDATE

Administrator Ritter provided a brief update on the progress being made with the sale of lots within the City Commerce Center.

#### XI. COUNCIL COMMENTS

**Council Member Chandler** expressed his appreciation for Staff and the FPDRAC for working diligently to finalize a plan for Cattlemen's Square. **Council Member Jarriel** recognized the incoming leadership and spoke briefly on the possibility of lowering the millage rate for next FY. **Council Members Keefe and Clark** echoed all comments. **Mayor Watford** informed everyone of the upcoming lunch being held for all first responders on Saturday, September 11, 2021 from 12:00 to 4:00 P.M. at the VFW Post 10539; all are invited.

## **ORDINANCE NO. 1234**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA; AMENDING THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, ORDINANCE NO. 635 AS AMENDED, BY REVISING THE FUTURE LAND USE MAP ON A CERTAIN TRACT OF LAND MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED HEREIN FROM SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL TO COMMERCIAL (APPLICATION NO. 21-005-SSA); PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION OF ORDINANCE AND REVISED FUTURE LAND USE MAP IN THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

- **WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Okeechobee recognizes the need to plan for orderly growth and development; and
- **WHEREAS,** Chapter 163, Florida Statutes provides for amendment to Adopted Comprehensive Plans; and
- WHEREAS, the City has received and reviewed certain Application (No. 21-005-SSA), submitted by Jeff Sumner, Authorized Representative of the property owner, Suraiya Husain Trustee of the Suraiya Husain Revocable Trust Agreement, for a small-scale amendment to the Future Land Use Map of the City's Comprehensive Plan, and said Application being reviewed by the City's Planning Board, acting as the Local Planning Agency, at a duly advertised Public Hearing held on August 19, 2021, which determined such request to be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and consistent with the pattern of future land uses within the City; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council has agreed with the recommendation of the Planning Board and finds that the proposed Application complies with the requirements of Florida Statute 163, Part II, and that the proposed Application is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and appropriate to the future land uses within the City.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** it is ordained before the City Council for the City of Okeechobee, Florida; presented at a duly advertised public meeting; and passed by majority vote of the City Council; and properly executed by the Mayor or designee, as Chief Presiding Officer for the City:

#### **SECTION 1**: SHORT TITLE.

**THIS ORDINANCE** shall be known as a "City of Okeechobee Small Scale Development Activities Comprehensive Plan Amendment," pursuant to Florida Statutes 163.3187, and shall be effective within the City limits of the City of Okeechobee, Florida.

#### **SECTION 2: AUTHORITY.**

This City of Okeechobee Small Scale Development Activities Comprehensive Plan Amendment is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 163.3187, Part II, Florida Statutes.

#### **SECTION 3:** REVISIONS TO THE FUTURE LAND USE MAP.

1. The following described land consisting of approximately 0.405 acres is hereby re-designated for purposes of the Future Land Use Map of the City of Okeechobee Comprehensive Plan:

Application No. 21-005-SSA, from Single Family Residential to Commercial. The Legal Description of Subject Property is as follows:

LOTS 19 AND 20, OF BLOCK 2, CITY OF OKEECHOBEE, ACCORDING TO THE PLAT THEREOF RECORDED IN PLAT BOOK 5, PAGE 5, PUBLIC RECORDS OF OKEECHOBEE COUNTY, FLORIDA.

# SECTION 4: INCLUSION OF ORDINANCE AND REVISED FUTURE LAND USE MAP IN THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN.

It is the intention of the City Council of the City of Okeechobee, Florida that the provisions of this Ordinance, and the revisions to the Future Land Use Map which are incorporated herein by reference, shall become and be made a part of the City of Okeechobee Comprehensive Plan (City of Okeechobee Ordinance No. 635, as amended).

#### **SECTION 5**: CONFLICT.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

#### **SECTION 6:** SEVERABILITY.

If any provision or portion of this Ordinance is declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be void, unconstitutional, or unenforceable, then all remaining provisions and portions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **SECTION 7**: EFFECTIVE DATE.

The effective date of this plan amendment shall be thirty-one (31) days after the adoption of this Ordinance, if not timely challenged. If timely challenged, this amendment shall become effective on the date the State Land Planning Agency or the Administration Commission enters a final order determining this adopted amendment to be in compliance. No development orders, development permits, or land uses dependent on this amendment may be issued or commence before it has become effective.

#### Request

The matter before the Local Planning Agency and City Council is an application for an amendment to the Future Land Use Map (FLUM) for a 0.405 acre parcel. The parcel is currently designated Single Family Residential on the Future Land Use Map and the Applicant is requesting a change to Commercial.

The subject property is vacant, though the adjacent parcels to the west are also owned by the applicant and developed with a medical office and parking lot.

#### **General Analysis and Staff Comments**

#### A. Qualification for Amendment

Based on the size of the property (0.405 acres), this application qualifies under Chapter 163, F.S. as a Small-Scale Development Activity Plan Amendment (SSA) to the Comprehensive Plan.

#### B. Current Development Potential as Single-Family Residential

The property is currently designated as single family residential on the City's Future Land Use Map and Heavy Commercial on the City's zoning map. Future land use Policy 2.1(a) allows a maximum standard density in the Single-Family Residential Future Land Use Category of four units per acre or five if the units qualify as affordable housing. With the affordable housing bonus, maximum development potential for 0.405 acres would be two single-family dwellings. However, because the parcel is only 117.5 feet wide, which is not wide enough to create two lots that meet the minimum lot width, only one single family dwelling unit could be developed. Additionally, in order to develop a single family dwelling unit at this property, a zoning map amendment would be required, as single family dwelling units are not permitted in the Heavy Commercial Zoning District.

#### C. Future Development Potential as Commercial

The Applicant has stated that there are no plans to develop this parcel at this time, and that the main purpose of this request is to make the future land use designation consistent with the zoning. However, if this map change is approved, the property may be developed according to standards of the Comprehensive Plan and the Land Development Code.

While the Commercial Future Land Use category allows for a maximum FAR of 3.0, the City's most intense commercial zoning district (CHV) only allows a maximum building coverage of 50% and a maximum building height of 45 feet (without a special use exception). These limitations allow for a potential three story structure, a maximum FAR of 1.5 and a maximum floor area of approximately 26,460 square feet on this 0.405 acre parcel.

However, given the parking requirements for most commercial uses and the maximum impervious surface ratio allowed in the Heavy Commercial of 85%, it would be difficult to provide sufficient parking for 26,460 square feet of commercial use on this parcel. Additionally, given the character of Okeechobee, it would be unusual to exceed two stories. A two-story structure with 50% building coverage on 0.405 acres would have a floor area of approximately 17,640 square feet.



#### D. Consistency and Compatibility with Comprehensive Plan and Adjacent Uses.

Policy 2.2 of the Future Land Use Element recommends that the City protect the use and value of private property from adverse impacts of incompatible land uses, activities and hazards.

Objective 12 states that the City of Okeechobee shall encourage compatibility with adjacent uses, and curtailment of uses inconsistent with the character and land uses of surrounding areas and shall discourage urban sprawl.

The subject parcel is approximately 250 feet from the US-441 right-of-way and while much of the surrounding property is vacant, there is an adjacent medical office and other healthcare facilities in close proximity. There are no single family homes in the immediate area.

Between the Comprehensive Plan (Future Land Use Map) the Land Development Code (Zoning Map), the Comprehensive Plan is the ruling document; and it is the typical zoning practice to make the zoning conform to the future land use map. However, there are many inconsistencies between the City's future land use map and zoning map. In some cases, the future land use designation of a particular property is a better fit for the existing land use and the pattern of land use in the area. In other cases, the zoning designation is a better fit. On this particular parcel the zoning designation of Heavy Commercial is a better fit for the pattern of land use than the future land use designation of single family residential.

#### E. Adequacy of Public Facilities

#### **Traffic Impacts**

Based on the change in the maximum development potential of this parcel if this request is approved, the applicant submitted a traffic analysis which indicates that the Institute of Transportation Engineers estimates a single family dwelling unit to generate 9.44 vehicle trips per day and 26,300 square feet of medical office to generate 922 vehicle trips per day. The potential increase of 913 daily trips is significant, though unlikely, as a 26,300 square foot facility is not a likely development at this location. Additionally, the applicant correctly points out that the proximity to US-441 would ease the burden on the local road network.

#### Demand for Potable Water and Sewer Treatment

The applicant has provided an analysis on the potential change in demand for potable water and sewer services if these map changes are approved. That analysis indicates an increase potential of 3,632 gallons of potable water demand and 3,589 gallons of sewer demand per day. We agree with this analysis.

The Applicant submitted letters from the Okeechobee Utility Authority and indicating that there is adequate excess capacity in the facilities to accommodate the demand for potable water and wastewater treatment. Though, at this time, there is no potable water distribution main or wastewater service line near the subject property; and all facility improvements required for connection must be at the owner's expense.



#### Demand for Solid Waste Disposal

Waste Management has previously confirmed a considerable level of excess capacity available to serve the solid waste disposal needs of other developments in the City. It's reasonable that the volume of solid waste generated by the proposed improvements can also be accommodated within the capacity of the County's Solid Waste Facility.

#### F. Environmental Impacts

The US Fish & Wildlife Service Wetland Inventory Map does not depict any wetlands on this parcel.

No critical habitat is identified on this parcel by the USFWS mapping.

#### Recommendation

Based on the foregoing analysis, we find the requested Commercial future land use designation for the subject property to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan, reasonably compatible with adjacent uses, and consistent with the urbanizing pattern of the area. Therefore, we recommend approval of the Applicant's request to amend the Future Land Use Map of the City's Comprehensive Plan to change the designation of this property from Single Family Residential to Commercial.





This letter report is intended to supplement the above-referenced application, specifically **Part IV** – **Amendment Support Documentation**. The subject property is part of an existing developed parcel (Lots 15 – 20, Block 2) owned by the applicant. Lots 15 - 18 currently have a FLU designation of Commercial and is currently developed with a medical office building and parking lot, while the lots subject to this application (Lots 19 - 20) have a FLU Designation of Single-Family Residential, and are currently vacant. Further, current zoning for all six lots is Heavy Commercial. Support documentation for the application is described below and/or attached hereto. I have attempted to use lettering/numbering consistent with that in the application form.

#### A. GENERAL INFORMATION AND MAPS

- 1. Wording of Proposed text changes. N/A No text changes are proposed.
- 2. A map showing the boundaries of the subject property, surrounding street network, and Future Land Use designations of surrounding properties. *Map A-2 Future Land Use Designations* is attached.
- 3. A map showing existing land uses (not designations) of the subject property and surrounding properties. *Map A-3 Existing Land Use (Actual)* is attached.
- 4. Written descriptions of the existing land uses and how the proposed Future Land Use designation is consistent with current uses and current Future Land Use designations. The subject property is within the urban developed area of the City Okeechobee. The existing use (commercial) and zoning (Heavy Commercial) are consistent with the requested land use change. Further, the requested change is consistent with the development pattern in the area, surrounded by either developed commercial uses or vacant tracts likely to be developed as commercial uses.
- 5. Map showing existing zoning of the subject property and surrounding properties. *Map A-5 Existing Zoning Designations* is attached.
- 6. Certified property boundary survey; date of survey; surveyor's name, address and phone number; and legal description(s) for the property subject to the requested change. A certified boundary survey of the subject parcel (Lots 19 20, Block 2) has been submitted to the City under separate cover. #### **B. PUBLIC FACILITIES IMPACTS**

1. Traffic Analysis – Utilizing the ITE Trip Generation Manual (10<sup>th</sup> Edition) to estimate traffic volumes associated with the proposed Land Use Designation (relative to the existing Land Use Designation), and utilizing the maximum development units for each as shown in Part III.B of the application, the estimated increase in expected traffic volumes is as follows:

An estimated increase of 90 PM peak trips and 96 AM peak trips should be considered insignificant given the proximity to a State Highway (US 441), and is not expected to burden existing LOS of the surrounding road network.

- 2. Potable Water and Sanitary Sewer / Open Space
  - a. Utilizing the LOS values in the City's Comprehensive Plan of 114 gallons per person per day (gppd) for water and 130 gppd for wastewater and 2.7 persons per DU, the potential water and sewer flows for the **existing** FLU category are:

1 DU x 2.7 people/DU x 114 gppd = 308 gallons per day (water)
1 DU x 2.7 people/DU x 130 gppd = 351 gallons per day (wastewater)
```

The Comprehensive Plan does not provide water or wastewater generation rates for commercial uses (understandably, as rates could vary greatly between various commercial uses). To estimate water and wastewater flows associated with the proposed FLU category, the City's Small-Scale Comprehensive Plan application utilizes a rate of 0.15 gallons per day for non-residential uses:

26,267 sq. ft. x 0.15 gpd / 100 sq. ft. = 3,940 (water and wastewater)

Increased water demand = 3,632 gallons per day Increased sewer demand = 3,589 gallons per day

- **b.** Recreation / Open Space **Not applicable to non-residential uses.**
- 3. Correspondence with the appropriate agencies substantiating the adequacy of existing facilities to support the proposed change are included as Appendix B-3. At this point, we have requested capacity confirmation letters from Okeechobee Utility Authority (water

and wastewater) and Okeechobee Landfill, Inc. (solid waste). As this is a non-residential use, capacity confirmation from the School Board is not applicable. We have conservatively requested capacity confirmation based on the maximum potential additional square footage as described in the preceding sections.

#### C. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS

- Wetlands and aquifer recharge areas. N/A the subject parent tract is already developed
  for the proposed use, and is within a developed urban area of the City. As confirmed by
  review of the National Wetland Inventory mapping system
  (https://www.fws.gov/wetlands/Data/Mapper.html), there are no on-site wetlands or
  recharge areas.
- Soils posing severe limitation to development. N/A the subject parent tract is already developed for the proposed use. Additional development on the subject tract can be accomplished with normal site preparation and soil treatment. A soils map is attached as Exhibit C-2.
- 3. Unique habitat. N/A there is no unique habitat on this cleared lot.
- 4. Endangered species of wildlife and plants. N/A there are no known endangered species present.
- 5. Floodprone areas. N/A the subject property is within the developed City of Okeechobee, and has a flood zone designation of X (Area of Minimal Flood Risk / 0.2 Percent Chance Annual Flood Hazard. <a href="https://msc.fema.gov/portal/search?AddressQuery=1300%20NE%2013th%20Street%2C%20Okeechobee%2C%20Florida#searchresultsanchor">https://msc.fema.gov/portal/search?AddressQuery=1300%20NE%2013th%20Street%2C%20Okeechobee%2C%20Florida#searchresultsanchor</a>

#### D. INTERNAL CONSISTENCY WITH THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

- 1. Effect on the established City of Okeechobee population projections. The proposed FLUM amendment changing the existing FLUM designation from Single-Family Residential to Commercial will have no affect on the established City of Okeechobee population projections. There will be no increase in residential population.

#### Future Land Use Element

Objective 2:The City of Okeechobee shall continue to ensure that all new development is consistent with the Future Land Use Element.

The existing FLUM designation for the subject property is Single-Family Residential. Abutting property FLUM designation on the west, north and east sides of the property is Commercial. The south side of the property is NE 13<sup>th</sup> Street. The FLUM designation on the south side of NE13th Street across from the subject property is Single-Family Residential. The proposed request for a Future Land Use Map Amendment is from Single-Family Residential to Commercial. The existing FLUM designation for the subject property, Single-Family Residential, is inconsistent with the abutting FLUM designation, Commercial, on three sides of the subject property. In addition, amending the FLUM designation to Commercial will render the subject property consistent with the underlying zoning designation, Heavy Commercial. At present, the property cannot be developed for commercial uses without this FLUM amendment.

#### Policy 2.1.d)

Commercial. Permitted uses include the full range of offices, retail, personal and business services, automotive, wholesale, warehousing, related commercial activities, and accessory uses customary to permissible uses. Other uses related to and consistent with commercial development such as houses of worship, public facilities, public utilities, communications facilities, hospitals, group homes, adult family care homes, assisted living facilities, and limited residential use associated with a commercial building, may be permissible under certain circumstances.

- 1. Commercial development shall not exceed a floor area ratio of 3.00 and the maximum impervious surface for development within this category shall not exceed 85 percent of the site.
- 2. Zoning districts considered appropriate within this future land use category include Commercial Professional Office (CPO), Light Commercial (CLT), Heavy Commercial (CHV), and Central Business District (CBD).

The proposed FLUM amendment to Commercial will not exceed a floor area ratio of 3.00. In fact, based on height and parcel size limitations, the FAR will not exceed 1.5.

Policy 2.5: The City shall amend its Future Land Use Map, as necessary, to address inconsistent land use areas.

Policy 3.3: The City of Okeechobee shall continue to coordinate with Okeechobee County in amending the City-County zoning maps to ensure that, all property in the City is zoned in accordance with the Future Land Use Element.

As stated above, amending the FLUM designation to Commercial will render the subject property consistent with the underlying zoning designation, Heavy Commercial.

Policy 12.1: Criteria, standards, and related provisions established in the Land Development Code for reducing the impacts from any land uses that are not in conformance or are inconsistent with this Comprehensive Plan shall as a minimum:

- a) Regulate the subdivision and platting of land.
- b) Regulate the use, intensity and location of land development in a manner that is compatible with adjacent land uses and provides delineation in the Conservation Element.
- c) Protect Conservation Use lands designated on the Future Land Use Map and those delineated in the Conservation Element.
- d) Regulate areas subject to seasonal and periodic flooding by requiring adequate drainage and stormwater.
- e) Ensure safe and convenient on-site traffic flow and vehicle parking needs through the Site Plan review process and off-street parking regulations.
- f) Ensure that public facility, utility and service authorization has been procured prior to issuing any development order and that construction of said facilities, utilities, and services is concurrent with development.
- g) Provide that development orders and permits shall not be issued which result in a reduction of the level of services for affected public (community) facilities.

The purpose of such regulations shall be to eliminate or reduce use inconsistent with the character of the surrounding area. Such criteria, standards, and related provisions shall not cause undue hardship, economic or otherwise, to the owners of such nonconforming uses.

There is no existing residential use on NE 13<sup>th</sup> Street east of N Parrott Avenue.





## MAP A-2 FUTURE LAND USE DESIGNATIONS






# MAP A-3 EXISTING LAND USE (ACTUAL)






## MAP A-5 EXISTING ZONING DESIGNATIONS









AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE FURTHER AMENDING THE CITY OF OKEECHOBEE GENERAL EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM, RESTATED PURSUANT TO ORDINANCE 1141; AMENDING SECTION 6, BENEFIT AMOUNTS AND ELIGIBILITY; AMENDING SECTION 10, OPTIONAL FORMS OF BENEFITS; AMENDING SECTION 15, MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION OF BENEFITS; AMENDING SECTION 25, REEMPLOYMENT AFTER RETIREMENT; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

- **WHEREAS**, the City of Okeechobee General employees are presently provided pension and certain other benefits under Ordinances of the City of Okeechobee; and
- **NOW THEREFORE,** be it ordained before the City Council of the City of Okeechobee, Florida; presented at a duly advertised public meeting; and passed by majority vote of the City Council; and properly executed by the Mayor or designee, as Chief Presiding Officer for the City:
- **SECTION 1**: That the City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System, restated pursuant to Ordinance No. 1141, as amended, is hereby further amended by amending Section 6, Benefit Amounts and Eligibility, subsection 5, Required Distribution Date, to read as follows:
  - 5. Required Distribution Date. The Member's benefit under this Section must begin to be distributed to the Member no later than April 1 of the calendar year following the later of the calendar year in which the Member attains age seventy and one-half (70½) or the calendar year in which the Member terminates employment with the City the Member's required beginning date, as provided under Section 15.
- **SECTION 2:** That the City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System, restated pursuant to Ordinance No. 1141, as amended, is hereby further amended by amending Section 10, Optional Forms of Benefits, subsection 5.E., to read as follows:
  - 5.E. The Member's benefit under this Section must begin to be distributed to the Member no later than April 1 of the calendar year following the later of the calendar year in which the Member attains age seventy and one-half (70½) or the calendar year in which the Member terminates employment with the City the Member's required beginning date, as provided under Section. 15.
- **SECTION 3**: That the City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System, restated pursuant to Ordinance No. 1141, as amended, is hereby further amended by amending Section 15, Minimum Distribution of Benefits, subsection 2.A., and subsection 2.B.(1), to read as follows:
  - 2.A. Required Beginning Date. The Member's entire interest will be distributed, or begin to be distributed, to the Member no later than the Member's required beginning date. which shall not be later than April 1 of the calendar year following the later of the calendar year in which the Member attains age seventy and one-half (70 ½) or the calendar year in which the Member terminated employment with the City. For a Member who attains age seventy and one-half (70 ½) prior to January 1, 2020, the Member's required beginning date is April 1 of the calendar year following the later of (i) the calendar year in which the Member attains age seventy and one-half (70 ½) or (ii) the calendar year in which the Member terminates employment with the City. For a Member who attains age seventy and one-half (70 ½) on or after January 1, 2020, the Member's required

- beginning date is April 1 of the calendar year following the later of (i) the calendar year in which the Member attains age seventy-two (72) or (ii) the calendar year in which the Member terminates employment with the City.
- 2.B.(1) If the Member's surviving spouse is the Member's sole designated beneficiary, then distributions to the surviving spouse will begin by December 31 of the calendar year immediately following the calendar year in which the Member died, or by a date on or before December 31 of the calendar year in which the Member would have attained age 70 ½ (or age 72 for a Member who would have attained age 70 ½ after December 31, 2019), if later, as the surviving spouse elects.

**SECTION 4**: That the City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System, restated pursuant to Ordinance No. 1141, as amended, is hereby further amended by amending Section 25, Reemployment After Retirement, subsections 2., 3., and 4., to read as follows:

- 2. After Normal Retirement. Any Retiree who is retired under normal retirement pursuant to this System and who is reemployed as a General Employee after that Retirement and, by virtue of that reemployment, is eligible to participate in this System, shall upon being reemployed continue receipt of benefits if he is at least age sixty-two (62) fifty-nine and one-half (59½), otherwise the System shall discontinue receipt of benefits until he reaches age sixty-two (62) fifty-nine and one-half (59½). Upon reemployment, the Retiree shall be deemed to be fully vested and the additional Credited Service accrued during the subsequent employment period shall be used in computing a second benefit amount attributable to the subsequent employment period, which benefit amount shall be added to the benefit determined upon the initial retirement to determine the total benefit payable upon final Retirement. Calculations of benefits upon Retirement shall be based upon the benefit accrual rate, Average Final Compensation, and Credited Service as of that date (not including any period of DROP participation) and the retirement benefit amount for any subsequent employment period shall be based upon the benefit accrual rate, Average Final Compensation, and Credited Service as of the date of subsequent retirement (based only on the subsequent employment period). The amount of any death or disability benefit received as a result of a subsequent period of employment shall be reduced by the amount of accrued benefit eligible to be paid for a prior period of employment. The optional form of benefit and any joint pensioner selected upon initial retirement shall not be subject to change upon subsequent retirement except as otherwise provided herein, but the Member may select a different optional form and joint pensioner applicable to the subsequent retirement benefit.
- 3. Any Retiree who is retired under normal retirement pursuant to this System and who is reemployed by the City after that Retirement and, by virtue of that reemployment is ineligible to participate in this System, shall, during the period of such reemployment, continue to receive retirement benefits previously earned if he is at least age sixty-two (62) fifty-nine and one-half (59½), otherwise the System shall discontinue receipt of benefits until he reaches age sixty-two (62) fifty-nine and one-half (59½). Former DROP participants shall begin receipt of benefits under these circumstances.
- 4. After Early or Disability Retirement. Any Retiree who is retired under early or disability retirement pursuant to this System and who subsequently becomes an employee of the City in any capacity, shall discontinue receipt of benefits from the System until the earlier of termination of employment or such time as the reemployed Retiree reaches age sixty-two (62) fifty-nine and one-half (59½). A Retiree who returns to work under the provisions of this Section shall not be eligible for membership in the System, and, therefore, shall not accumulate additional Credited Service for subsequent periods of employment described in this Section, shall not

be required to make contributions to the System, nor shall he be eligible for any other benefit other than the Retiree's early retirement benefit when he again becomes eligible as provided herein. Retirement pursuant to an early retirement incentive program shall be deemed early retirement for purposes of this Section if the Member was permitted to retire prior to the customary retirement date provided for in the System at the time of retirement.

<u>SECTION 5</u>: Specific authority is hereby granted to codify and incorporate this Ordinance in the existing Code of Ordinances of the City of Okeechobee.

**SECTION 6**: All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 7:** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase of this ordinance, or the particular application thereof shall be held invalid by any court, administrative agency, or other body with appropriate jurisdiction, the remaining section, subsection, sentences, clauses, or phrases under application shall not be affected thereby.

**SECTION 8:** That this Ordinance shall become effective upon adoption.

As you know, I represent the Board of Trustees of your City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System. Enclosed please find a proposed ordinance amending the City of Okeechobee General Employees' Retirement System that has been approved by the Board and recommended for adoption by the City Council. This ordinance makes the following suggested revisions and changes:

- 1. Section 6, Benefit Amounts and Eligibility, Section 10, Optional Forms of Benefits, and Section 15, Minimum Distribution of Benefits are all being amended to provide for recent changes to the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) changing the required distribution age from 70½ to age 72.
- 2. Section 25, Reemployment After Retirement, is being amended is being amended to provide that normal or early retirees who are reemployed by the City may continue receipt of their benefits if or when they have reached age 59½. This reduction from age 62 is a change in accordance with recent changes to the IRC.

I have enclosed a copy of a letter from the Board's actuary, Gabriel Roeder Smith & Company, indicating that there is no impact in connection with the adoption of this ordinance. If you or any member of your staff have any questions with regard to this ordinance, please feel free to give me a call. In addition, if you feel it would be appropriate for me to be present at the meeting at which this ordinance is considered by the City Council, please contact my office to advise me of the date that the ordinance would be considered.

Based upon our review, the proposed Ordinance:

If a fund is underperforming he puts them on a watch list and brings it to the attention of the Board, but will only replace a fund at the direction of the Board. Mr. Christiansen stated the Board must declare the expected rate of return; which was 7% in the Valuation.

- **WHEREAS**, the City Of Okeechobee recognizes the need to plan for orderly growth and development; and the State Legislature passed the Community Planning Act requiring all local governments to prepare and adopt a Comprehensive Plan; and
- **WHEREAS**, Chapter 163, Florida Statutes authorizes amendments to Adopted Comprehensive Plans under the Expedited Review Process; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City recognizes the adoption of House Bill 59 requiring adoption of a Property Rights Element into the City's Comprehensive Plan; and
- WHEREAS, the Planning Board, acting as the Local Planning Agency of the City of Okeechobee, Florida, recently reviewed and discussed proposed Comprehensive Plan Amendment No. 21-002-CPA at a duly advertised public hearing on August 19, 2021, and determined such request to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan and recommends the City Council transmit the proposed amendment to the State Land Planning Agency for review and approval, and subsequent adoption by ordinance by the City Council; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council has agreed with the recommendation of the Planning Board and finds that Comprehensive Plan Amendment No. 21-002-CPA complies with the requirements of Florida Statutes 163, Part II, and that the proposed Application is consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** it is ordained before the City Council for the City of Okeechobee, Florida; presented at a duly advertised public meeting; and passed by majority vote of the City Council; and properly executed by the Mayor or designee, as Chief Presiding Officer for the City:

#### **SECTION 1: SHORT TITLE.**

**THIS ORDINANCE** shall be known as a "City of Okeechobee Comprehensive Plan Amendment," pursuant to Florida Statutes 163.3184, regarding Application No. 21-002-CPA and shall be effective within the corporate boundaries of the City of Okeechobee, Florida.

#### **SECTION 2: AUTHORITY.**

This City of Okeechobee Comprehensive Plan Amendment is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 163.3184, Florida Statutes.

#### **SECTION 3: REVISIONS TO THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN.**

The City Council for the City of Okeechobee, Florida amends herein the Comprehensive Plan by adding a Property Rights Element to read as follows:

#### **Property Rights Element**

#### Goals, Objectives and Policies

Goal:	The City shall recognize and respect all judicially acknowledged or constitutionally
	protected private property rights.
Objective 1:	Private property rights shall be considered in the City's decision making.
Policy 1.1:	Property owners shall have the right to physically possess and control their interests
	in the property, including easements, leases, or mineral rights.
Policy 1.2:	Property owners shall have the right to use, maintain, develop, and improve their
·	property for personal use or for the use of any other person, subject to state law and
	local ordinances.

Policy 1.3: Property owners shall have the right to privacy and to exclude others from the property to protect their possessions and property.

Policy 1.4: Property owners shall have the right to dispose of their property through sale or gift.

#### SECTION 3: INCLUSION OF ORDINANCE AND REVISED COMPREHENSIVE PLAN.

It is the intention of the City Council of the City of Okeechobee, Florida that the provisions of this Ordinance, and the revisions to the Comprehensive Plan which are incorporated herein by reference, shall become and be made a part of the City of Okeechobee Comprehensive Plan (City of Okeechobee Ordinance No. 635, as amended).

#### **SECTION 4: CONFLICT.**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

#### **SECTION 5: SEVERABILITY.**

If any provision or portion of this ordinance is declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be void, unconstitutional, or unenforceable, then all remaining provisions and portions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **SECTION 6: EFFECTIVE DATE.**

The effective date of this plan amendment, if the amendment is not timely challenged, shall be 31 days after the State Land Planning Agency notifies the local government that the plan amendment package is complete. If timely challenged, this amendment shall become effective on the date the State Land Planning Agency or the Administration Commission enters a final order determining this adopted amendment to be in compliance. No development orders, development permits, or land uses dependent on this amendment may be issued or commence before it has become effective. If a final order of noncompliance is issued by the Administration Commission, this amendment may nevertheless be made effective by adoption of a resolution affirming its effective status, a copy of which resolution shall be sent to the State Land Planning Agency.

Subject: Property Rights Element Comprehensive Plan Amendment

On June 29<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the Governor signed House Bill 59 into law. One of the requirements of HB 59 is that every local government in the state of Florida must adopt a Property Rights Element into their Comprehensive Plan. The legislation provides a recommended "statement of rights" for inclusion in the Element. Though local governments are not required to adopt the exact language of the recommended statement of rights, the language that is adopted may not be in conflict with the provided statements.

Another requirement of HB 59 is that local governments must adopt the Property Rights Element prior to adoption of any other comprehensive plan amendments that have been initiated after July 1, 2021. As discussed at the July 15, 2021 Planning Board meeting, it is staff's contention that the City's proposed commercial corridor plan amendment was initiated prior to July 1, 2021 and should be allowed to be submitted to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) (state land planning agency) prior to the adoption of the Property Rights Element.

City staff corresponded with DEO staff and provided documentation to verify that advertised public workshops for the proposed commercial corridor plan amendment were held in April and May and that the City paid for public hearing advertisement of that amendment in June prior to the adoption of the legislation. Nevertheless, DEO staff has stated that they are not considering the amendment to be initiated prior to July 1<sup>st</sup> because a public hearing was not held in June.

At the July public hearing for the proposed commercial corridor amendment, the Planning Board voted to continue the hearing of that amendment to the September meeting and directed staff to bring the Property Rights Element for a public hearing as soon as possible so that it could be adopted prior to, or concurrently with the adoption of the Commercial Corridor Amendment. Attached is a proposed Ordinance for adoption of the Property Rights Element. The language that is included in the proposed policies is the recommended statement of rights included in the legislation. The proposed Goal includes an excerpt of existing language from Florida Statute Section 163.3161(10), which is also referenced in HB 59, along with Florida Statute Section 187.101(3). The full text of those statute sections is provided below. The full, adopted text of HB 59 is also attached.

If the Planning Board, acting as City's Local Planning Agency, agrees that the text changes in this proposed amendment are desirable and consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan, we request that they recommend that the City Council transmit this amendment to DEO. The Board may also consider adopting alternative language for the Property Rights Element, as long as it does not conflict with the statement of rights provided in the statute.

If the City Council also agrees that this proposed amendment is desirable and consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan, then they may vote to transmit to DEO. Once the state and various agencies (FDOT, FDEP, SFWMD, etc.) have had 30 days to review the amendment, if there are

no objections, then the City Council may adopt the amendment at a final public hearing.

#### Florida Statute Section 163.3161(10)

It is the intent of the Legislature that all governmental entities in this state recognize and respect judicially acknowledged or constitutionally protected private property rights. It is the intent of the Legislature that all rules, ordinances, regulations, comprehensive plans and amendments thereto, and programs adopted under the authority of this act must be developed, promulgated, implemented, and applied with sensitivity for private property rights and not be unduly restrictive, and property owners must be free from actions by others which would harm their property or which would constitute an inordinate burden on property rights as those terms are defined in s. 70.001(3)(e) and (f). Full and just compensation or other appropriate relief must be provided to any property owner for a governmental action that is determined to be an invalid exercise of the police power which constitutes a taking, as provided by law. Any such relief must ultimately be determined in a judicial action.

#### Florida Statute Section 187.101(3)

The goals and policies contained in the State Comprehensive Plan shall be reasonably applied where they are economically and environmentally feasible, not contrary to the public interest, and consistent with the protection of private property rights. The plan shall be construed and applied as a whole, and no specific goal or policy in the plan shall be construed or applied in isolation from the other goals and policies in the plan.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1238

Re: Arm-tractor replacement purchase order request

Public Works is requesting the approval for the purchase of a new Energreen ILF Aspen telescopic tool carrier with 29'9" arm and 47" flail head mower from Energreen America for \$205,000.04. The new mower will replace our existing arm tractor which was purchased in 2011. The existing arm tractor is out of service due to problems with the mower head.

Over the past few weeks, I have done extensive research including talking with manufacturers and end users at several municipalities and counties throughout Florida. Two options were evaluated to determine the best option for the replacement of our arm-tractor. The first option was to purchase a unit similar to our arm tractor consisting of an agricultural type tractor with an arm mower attachment.



**Traditional Ag tractor with Arm Mower Attachment** 

The Ag tractor/mower combination has the advantage of generally being lower priced however there are distinct disadvantages to this option:

- The Ag tractor/mower combination are typically a single use piece of equipment that can only be used for mowing.
- Because of the weight and length of the mower arm attachment, Ag tractor/mower arm combinations are susceptible to failure in both the frame connection of the mower to the tractor as well as the rear axle of the tractor. Our existing arm tractor experienced both of these failures. The cost of the repairs was more than \$20,000 and resulted in months of down time.
- Because of the configuration of the arm, visibility of the cutting head is limited which can lead to damage of the cutting head as well as other objects in the path of the mower.

Several tractor/mower combinations are available through the Florida Sheriff's Association annual bid. The price rage for a replacement with a comparable specification to our existing unit was from \$150,000 to \$219,000. The low-price option based on a Case IH Maxxum tractor was my first option, however I was informed by the dealer representative that due to current manufacturing conditions, the lead time for the purchase of a unit from Case would be more than one year. The next lowest priced unit was a John Deere/Alamo combination. Given the significant issues we have had with our existing Alamo mowers as well as the negative feedback I receive from other Alamo users, purchasing another Alamo mower is not acceptable. The price of the other two mowers was comparable with the tool carrier option which has several advantages over the Ag tractor/mower arm combination.

The second option that was evaluated is known as a tool carrier.





## **Tool Carrier with Arm Mower Attachment**

Three different tool carriers were evaluated with the Energreen option being recommended having the mid-price point. I spoke with several of the municipalities that had experience with the low cost option from Mowermax. Several of the people I talked to said they had significant mechanical issues including one that reported the unit catching fire during the demo by the manufacturer. Pinellas County is using the Energreen equipment and highly recommends it and Martin County is strongly considering purchasing Energreen equipment to replace their arm tractor fleet. ## AGREEMENT for GRANT MANAGEMENT SERVICES

## ARTICLE II

In accordance with the Proposal, the Contractor shall furnish at his own expense all labor, vehicles, materials, tools and equipment needed to perform the services required.

Annual management fees and per-application fees shall be made in accordance with the terms of the Proposal. For grant applications not contemplated in the proposed pricing, a cost will be negotiated prior the issuance of a work authorization.

## ARTICLE VI

Contractor shall not unlawfully discriminate against any person in its operations and activities or in its use or expenditure of funds in fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement. Contractor shall affirmatively comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in the course of providing any services funded by this Agreement, including Titles I and II of the ADA (regarding nondiscrimination on the basis of disability), and all applicable regulations, guidelines, and standards. Utilizing multiple funding sources has become the most effective way of maximizing the amount of funding a community can obtain. "Grant Stacking" allows a project to draw funding from several sources. The idea of "Grant Stacking" refers to grouping grants of varying levels (federal, state and local) to support one project. Careful selection of grants can result in one grant providing the matching funds requirement for another grant and the reciprocal as well. This process can address acquisition and development in phases to best meet a project's intent and time schedule.





The initial term of this Agreement shall be for a period of two (2) consecutive years. If mutually agreed upon, the contract may be renewed for two additional two (2) year terms for a total maximum contract period of six (6) years.

## ARTICLE IV

If it is determined that it is in the best interest of either party of the Agreement to terminate this Agreement prior to the expiration date, for cause, a thirty (30) calendar day written notice shall be given by the party wishing to terminate this Agreement.

## ARTICLE V

Contractor agrees to indemnify and save CITY, its public officials, agents, servants and employees harmless from and against any and all claims arising out of or in any way connected with the willful misconduct or negligence of the contractor, or its employees, to protect the CITY and its interests from such actions of the contractor or sub-contractors. Contractor further agrees to reimburse CITY for any and all court costs and other expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees incurred by CITY in defending any action, at both the trial and appellate levels, including paralegal expenses associated therewith, brought against CITY for injury or damage claimed to have been suffered as a result of or in any way connected with contractor's willful misconduct or negligence or that of its employees.

## ARTICLE VI

Nondiscrimination Equal Employment Opportunity and Americans With Disabilities Act:

Contractor shall not unlawfully discriminate against any person in its operations and activities or in its use or expenditure of funds in fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement. Contractor shall affirmatively comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in the course of providing any services funded by this Agreement, including Titles I and II of the ADA (regarding nondiscrimination on the basis of disability), and all applicable regulations, guidelines, and standards. In addition, CONTRACTOR shall take affirmative steps to ensure nondiscrimination in employment against disabled persons. Such actions shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff, termination, rates of pay, other forms of compensation, terms and conditions of employment, training (including apprenticeship) and accessibility.

Contractor's decisions regarding the delivery of services under this Agreement shall be made without regard to or consideration of race, age, religion, color, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, national origin, marital status, physical or mental disability, political affiliation, or any other factor which cannot be lawfully used as a basis for service delivery.

Contractor shall not engage in or commit any discriminatory practice in violation of the Broward County Human Rights Act (Broward County Code, Chapter 162) in performing any services pursuant to this Agreement.

## ARTICLE VII

Public Records

The City of Oakland Park is a public agency subject to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. The Contractor shall comply with Florida's Public Records Law. Specifically, the Contractor shall:

- Keep and maintain public records that ordinarily and necessarily would be required by the City in order to perform the service;
- Provide the public with access to such public records on the same terms and conditions that the City would provide the records and at a cost that does not exceed that provided in chapter 119, Fla. Stat., or as otherwise provided by law;
- Ensure that public records that are exempt or that are confidential and exempt from public record requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law; and
- 4. Meet all requirements for retaining public records and transfer to the City, at no cost, all public records in possession of the contractor upon termination of the contract and destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt. All records stored electronically must be provided to the City in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the agency.

"Grant Stacking" allows a project to draw funding from several sources. The idea of "Grant Stacking" refers to grouping grants of varying levels (federal, state and local) to support one project. Careful selection of grants can result in one grant providing the matching funds requirement for another grant and the reciprocal as well. This process can address acquisition and development in phases to best meet a project's intent and time schedule.





# **Grant Management Costs**

Except for Department Heads, and Police Department Employees, appointees must be residents of Okeechobee County, or any areas bordering Okeechobee County, by the end of the six (6) month probation period, and appointees must be citizens or resident aliens of the State of Florida and the United States of America.

Upon employment by the City, a Department Head will enter a three (3) month probationary period. After the probationary period ends satisfactorily, a Department Head will be allowed up to six (6) months to become a resident of Okeechobee County, Buckhead Ridge area of Glades County, or any areas lying outside the Okeechobee County line, but have Okeechobee addresses, and appointees must be citizens or resident aliens of the State of Florida and the United States of America.

**Background:** This amendment would broaden the applicant base for all departments for vacant positions being advertised currently and in the future.
